Aesop (c.602-564 B.C.) was said to be an ancient Greek fabulist, or storyteller, credited with a number of fables collectively known as Aesop's Fables. Numerous tales are credited to him; many characterized by animals and inanimate objects that speak, solve problems, and generally display human characteristics. Scattered details of Aesop's life can be found in ancient sources where he is described as a strikingly ugly slave who, by his cleverness, acquires freedom and becomes an adviser to kings. Scholars speculate that although no writings by him survive, there probably existed an original book whose contents survived through the works of other Greek and Latin authors.
